Subject: English

Topic: Literary Paragraph Writing

Learning Goal:

Students will write a paragraph that analyzes a character's development in a short story or novel, using evidence from the text.

The Original Task (before modification)

"Write a literary paragraph analyzing how the main character changes over the course of the story. Include a clear topic sentence, supporting evidence, analysis, and a concluding sentence."

Challenge:

This is a high-level task that requires organizing thoughts, integrating quotations, and using formal language - all at once. This can overwhelm English learners or students who need support with academic writing.

Modified Version (Same Learning Goal, Simplified Process)

- Choice of story or character based on interest and familiarity
- Teacher conferencing or peer editing option

Why It Works

This version breaks the writing task into clear, manageable parts without lowering the academic expectation. It builds confidence while still teaching how to support ideas with evidence and structure.
